## Spelling Glossary

| phoneme | individual speech sounds |
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| grapheme | a letter or group of letters that represent a phoneme |
| vowel | sounds made without the teeth, lips or tongue (a, e, i, o, <br> u) |
| short vowel | a as in cat, e as in bed, i as in bin, o as in hot, u as in bus |
| long vowel | longer vowel sounds such as in play, seat, light, boat, <br> boot, fair, car, shout, boy, etc. |
| consonant | sounds made with the lips, teeth or tongue (e.g., b, d, f, <br> th, l, $\mathbf{m}, \mathbf{p}$, sh, etc.) |
| digraph | a two-letter grapheme that makes one sound (e.g., ship, <br> boot, tree, ball, etc.) |
| split digraph | a digraph that is split by a consonant - used to be known <br> as the 'magic e' (late, bite, rule, etc.) |
| root word | a basic word with no affixes (e.g. lock) |
| affix | a group of letters added to a word to change its meaning <br> (can be a prefix or a suffix) |
| prefix | an affix that is added to the beginning of a root word to <br> change its meaning (e.g., un + lock = unlock) |
| suffix | an affix that is added to the end of a root word to change <br> its meaning (e.g., lock + ed = locked) |
| noun | a naming word. e.g., a thing, person, animal, place (e.g., <br> table, Mr. Rubba, horse, Oxford) |
| verb | an action or being word (e.g., dance, is, helped) |
| adjective | a word that describes a noun (e.g., red, old, happy) |
| adverb | a word that describes a verb (e.g. sadly, often) |
| plural | when a noun is plural it means there is more than one <br> (e.g., schools, children, women) |
| synonym | a word that means the same as another word (e.g. big, <br> huge, enormous, etc.) |
| antonym | a word that means the opposite of another word (e.g., like <br> and dislike) |
| contraction | when two words a joined together with an apostrophe <br> representing any missing letters (e.g., do + not = don't) |
| possessive apostrophe | when an apostrophe is used to show that something <br> belongs to someone or something (e.g., the child's bag, <br> the girls' bikes) |
