Spelling Glossary

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phoneme	individual speech sounds
grapheme	a letter or group of letters that represent a phoneme
vowel	sounds made without the teeth, lips or tongue (a, e, i, o,
	u)
short vowel	a as in cat, e as in bed, i as in bin, o as in hot, u as in bus
long vowel	longer vowel sounds such as in play, seat, light, boat,
	b oo t, f air , c ar , sh ou t, b oy , etc.
consonant	sounds made with the lips, teeth or tongue (e.g., b, d, f,
	th, I, m, p, sh, etc.)
digraph	a two-letter grapheme that makes one sound (e.g., sh ip,
	b oo t, tr ee , ba ll , etc.)
split digraph	a digraph that is split by a consonant – used to be known
	as the 'magic e' (late, bite, rule, etc.)
root word	a basic word with no affixes (e.g. lock)
affix	a group of letters added to a word to change its meaning
	(can be a prefix or a suffix)
prefix	an affix that is added to the beginning of a root word to
	change its meaning (e.g., un + lock = unlock)
suffix	an affix that is added to the end of a root word to change
	its meaning (e.g., lock + ed = locked)
noun	a naming word – e.g., a thing, person, animal, place (e.g.,
	table, Mr. Rubba, horse, Oxford)
verb	an action or being word (e.g., dance, is, helped)
adjective	a word that describes a noun (e.g., red, old, happy)
adverb	a word that describes a verb (e.g. sadly, often)
plural	when a noun is plural it means there is more than one
	(e.g., schools, children, women)
synonym	a word that means the same as another word (e.g. big,
	huge, enormous, etc.)
antonym	a word that means the opposite of another word (e.g., like
	and dislike)
contraction	when two words a joined together with an apostrophe
	representing any missing letters (e.g., do + not = don't)
possessive apostrophe	when an apostrophe is used to show that something
	belongs to someone or something (e.g., the child's bag,
	the girls' bikes)



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
